

We had a total of 77 responses from parents, which is a small increase on last year's 70. However, those responses covered a total of 113 children, which is a marked increase on last year's 78. Responses also came from a good range of year groups across the school, which is important. We are already looking into all the best ways to collect responses next year and we are exploring potential new formats for the survey.

The format of the above table combines the two degrees of agreement or disagreement, which is more relevant to the strongly agree/agree categories simply because, as with previous years, there are overwhelmingly more of these. The column "N/A" in the table above includes not just the N/A on the original survey but also those few items that were left blank.

Ofsted advises that schools need to have 85% agreement with positive statements in order to consider their provision, from a parents' point of view, as outstanding. As you can see from the table, we are showing over 85% agreement against all statements except one (which is addressed below). We are particularly pleased to see a significant increase in the number of parents who feel that unacceptable behaviour is dealt with effectively. It is also great to see 100% agreement with some statements. Where there have been any decreases in agreement, the governing body will look at these specifically and work with the senior leadership team to think about whether/how improvements can be made. For example, we regularly review progress data together to ensure that all children are making the progress they should be. If you have any feedback about the new reporting arrangements, statutory assessments and the focus on reaching 'expected levels' for each year group, please do pass it on.

It was great to see such a huge range of comments, all of which have been looked at closely by the leadership team and the governors. I have highlighted a few examples below, focusing on those aspects of the school that were mentioned multiple times.

Regarding what you like about Eleanor Palmer, the comments really focused on the community feel, the friendliness, and the supportive and nurturing aspects of the school. One comment was that there is a "sense of school community which goes beyond education" and another that "the teachers really care" and that they are "engaged, pro-active and exceptional...this shines through in everything they do."

In terms of improvements, there were a couple of things that were mentioned a few times:

- School dinners. There was a clear feeling that there could be improvements to both the quality and quantity.
  - We are taking this forward immediately, looking into the current provision and considering how we can ensure this important part of the day is as good as it can be.
- More after-school clubs/activities with more art and drama opportunities. This is a recurring theme of parent questionnaires each year and something that we are always reviewing and looking in to. As a small primary school, we have obvious limitations on the range of activities we can offer (e.g. space, teacher time); we endeavour to make sure that what we are able to offer meets the needs of as many children as possible. Another principle that we continue to adhere to is to keep all clubs free - expanding the offer could necessitate charging.
